Hymn No. 670 - "If Thou But Suffer God to Guide Thee"

Written in 1641, this hymn by Georg Neumark, relates a similar confidence in the sovereignty of God in the midst of uncertain and cruel events. As a young man on his way to university, Neumark was set upon by bandits and robbed of all that he had, apart from some money that had been sewn into his clothes and a praver book. Unable to continue the rest of the way, Neumark (unsuccessfully at first) attempted to gain employment as a tutor. In recalling this incident in his life, he penned both the words of his famous hymn and its accompanying tune: If thou but suffer God to guide thee, and hope in Him through all thy ways, He'll give thee strength whate'er betide thee, and bear thee through the evil days. Who trusts in God's unchanging love builds on the Rock that naught can move. In Catherine Winkworth's translation, we catch a glimpse of Neumark's inner struggle with providence, even to the point of initial bitterness: What can these anxious cares avail thee, these never-ceasing moans and sighs? What can it help, if thou bewail thee, o'er each dark moment as it flies? Our cross and trials do but press the heavier for our bitterness.
