Making a Joyful Noise

Devotional Thoughts on Congregational Singing

Let God speak directly to His People through the Scriptures, and let His people respond with grateful songs of praise.

-Martin Luther

Created to Sing - In His Image

We are creatures uniquely made in God's image (Gen. 1:26-28). We are designed to benefit from beauty in creativity. God made us to be powerfully engaged in our senses and memories to music. Songs have the power to prompt memory or transport us back to some other time and place. Our imagination is another aspect of the dignity we have been given by God. Music ventures into the inner corridors of our soul in ways that other things do not – it moves us deeply.

Echoing through our congregational singing is the communication the divine Author has written into this world. Singing together organizes notes and words in beautiful ways to shine God's dazzling truths into the relativistic grays of our culture. It is an incredible thing that we, the created ones, have been given a way to communicate with the One Who made us and His ears are open and listening as we lift our voices.

As we sing to God and about God together with the people of God, we reflect the truth that we were designed for community both with God and with each other. When His Church sings together with voice upon voice like arms linked across a room, across the globe and across history, we are doing what we were designed to – use our God-given voices to sing praises together to the One Who gave us voices.

CORPORATE CHRISTIAN WORSHIP is a dialogue between God and His people. It is what we say and do when we come into the presence of God as His people in community. Because we were made for life in communion with God, this dialogue with God in worship is life giving to us as His people. "You make known to me the path of life; in Your presence there is fullness of joy; at Your right hand are pleasures forevermore." Psalm 16:11.

In worship we not only give God His due praise, we find that <u>it transforms us into the glorious humanity God intended from the beginning</u>. In worship, we are "re-imaged" into the likeness of Christ Who is the very Imprint of the glory of God. Worship is not just a meeting, it is service where we are called to actively participate in ascribing glory to God through listening, praying, singing, speaking, and the sacraments.

- Because we believe worship should be shaped by God's word, we are committed to worship that is God-centered, biblically based, simple, and reliant on the means of grace.
- Because we believe **worship should be life-giving**, we are committed to worship that is <u>vibrant</u>, <u>exciting, meaningful</u>, filled with the Holy Spirit, authentic, and inspirational.
- Because we believe **worship should be engaging**, we are committed to worship that is relevant, participatory, culturally appropriate, and winsome.
- Because we believe that worship should be rooted in traditions that unite us with the church
 across generations, we are committed to worship that is reformed, Presbyterian, and historically
 informed.

We are committed to morning and evening worship because it is both right and good. It is right because it follows the biblical pattern of worship God's people have followed since the earliest days. It is good because the different styles of the two services work together to develop the whole person (intellectually, emotionally, behaviorally) into the men and women God wants us to be. They are different but complementary in their form, style, and music.

Evening worship is on Sunday at 6:00 p.m. The form and style of our evening service is less structured than the morning and tends to emphasize the nearness of God. In addition to the sermon, evening worship includes extended times of singing, testimonies of God's grace from members, prayers from God's people, and responsive readings. The style of the evening service is more relaxed and informal. Music on Sunday evenings may include traditional hymns but mostly draws from sources such as Townend/Getty, Sovereign Grace Music, Indelible Grace, southern gospel hymns, and praise and worship choruses. We are committed to music that is theologically sound and musically appropriate for worship, and the church is blessed today with a <u>richness of congregational hymns being written by living hymnwriters</u>. Ensembles of piano/keyboard, guitar, cello, and other instruments normally lead our music at evening worship.

We believe that the tradition and transcendence of morning worship paired with the immanence and warmth of evening worship combine to shape corporate dialogue and fellowship with our Lord that is both foundationally strong and emotionally authentic. We hope you will join us for BOTH morning and evening worship.
