and make our wilderness blossom with life,


so that with the morning stars we might sing for gladness







Making a Joyful Noise

Devotional Thoughts on Congregational Singing

Let God speak directly to His people through the Scriptures, and let His people respond with grateful songs of praise.

- Martin Luther

Commanded to Sing

Scripture contains many exhortations to sing to God. Repeatedly, we are encouraged to be a singing people with more than 400 references to singing in the Bible and at least 50 direct commands to sing. Just as we are told to study the Scriptures, to pray, to give, to take communion, so we are commanded to sing with the saints. It is interesting and mysterious that this particular activity is commanded, both within and outside of worship. God's commands are good for us; there are so many spiritual benefits we receive from singing and 'making melody in your heart' (Ephesians 5:19).

Sing to the Lord a new song, His praise in the assembly of the saints (Psalm 149:1).

The command is not to sing just to ourselves or by ourselves, but as part of "the assembly of the saints" – that is, in the company of other believers and with your church. It is not a metaphorical, or optional, or seasonal suggestion, but a clear directive from our Lord and Savior to sing as a regular part of our worship life, primarily and especially with other believers. Just as we are called to gather together every Sunday for worship, so we are called to sing when in His presence. If we neglect singing, corporately or individually, we neglect communing with the Lord, and with His saints.

Within any assembly, we may sing songs that we may not have chosen because they are not our favorite, to arrangements or with accompaniments that we may not have chosen. On such occasions, we need to be willing to lay down our own tastes for the good of the wider assembly. For as long as we have the health and the ability, we are each called to sing with the people of God, and to love the people of God enough to sing; dying to ourselves and glorifying the Lord in the process.

Guest Minister

Rev. Dr. Peter Lillback

Today we welcome Rev. Dr. Peter Lillback to the Trinity Church pulpit. Dr. Lillback is President and Professor of Historical Theology and Church History at Westminster Theological Seminary. He holds a doctorate degree from Westminster Theological Seminary and a master's degree from Dallas Theological Seminary. Dr. Lillback has been ordained in the Orthodox Presbyterian Church, and holds his present credentials as a teaching elder in the Presbyterian Church in America.

Dr. Lillback's academic interests include church history, the doctrine of Scripture, public theology, the theology of John Calvin, Johannine Theology, and Christianity as it relates to American history. He co-edited, with David Hall, *A Theological Guide to Calvin's Institutes: Essays and Analysis* and co-edited with Dr. Richard Gaffin, *Thy Word Is Still Truth*, which is a survey of essential writings on the doctrine of Scripture from the Reformation to today. Portions of Dr. Lillback's research on Christianity in American history is described in his publications, *George Washington's Sacred Fire and Wall of Misconception*. His lecture, "The American Presbyterian Experience of Religious Liberty and the American Amendments to the Westminster Confession," may be found on the Westminster Seminary website. Dr. Lillback also serves as the president emeritus and founder of The Providence Forum and as the senior editor of the new *Unio cum Christo: An International Journal of Reformed Theology and Life*.
