OUR HISTORY

Trinity Presbyterian Church has, for 132 years, existed to exalt our Savior Jesus Christ, expound the Holy Scriptures, and exhort sinners.

Organized July 30, 1891, by a commission of the South Alabama Presbytery, Trinity was

first given the name "Central Presbyterian Church." The little body of believers called Rev. Neal Larkin Anderson to be their first minister. There were 32 charter members who worshipped at services held in the Montgomery County Courthouse until their new church building at Washington and Lawrence Streets was completed and dedicated in April 1894. By that time, the membership numbered 139 communicants. Reverend Anderson provided strong leadership for the growing church for 16 years.

Central Presbyterian Church

Rev. Dr. Neander Montgomery Woods assumed the pastorate in 1908, and by the time of his death two years later church membership had increased to 438 men, women, and children.

Central Church was outgrowing her building. Though some were reluctant to leave their beloved church home, in 1909 the members voted to purchase property at the corner of Hull Street and Felder Avenue. The new location was chosen to follow the southward-mov-

ing population of Montgomery as emerging transportation systems offered citizens ease of

traveling greater distances.

A wooden chapel was built in eight days along the Hull Street side of the new property. There, services were held until March 1913 when the sanctuary, designed by Frank Lockwood, was completed. At that time, it was decided that "Central" was no longer appropriate, so "Trinity," the name of charter member and deacon Robert Brown's home church in Scotland, was adopted.

After Dr. Woods' death, Rev. William Parker Neilson was

installed as minister in 1910. During his five years of service he oversaw the transition of the membership to their new church home, established Bible meetings in rural areas near Montgomery, and fostered an interest in foreign missions.

In 1915, Trinity's fourth minister, Legh Richmond Scott, took up residence in Montgomery. Foundations were laid for Millbrook Presbyterian Church through the vigorous Sunday school he organized there. Dr. Scott shepherded his flock through the anxious days of World War I and the Spanish influenza epidemic.

Dr. Charles R. Pratt succeeded Dr. Scott in 1920. Dr. Pratt had served as a missionary to Korea, and during his time at Trinity he offered a world-wide vision to the now several hundred

members. In 1922, the Religious Work Building was built on the site of the old wooden chapel. This building included youth facilities, a parlor, and a fellowship hall. We know these areas today as the Spires Room, the Bookstore, and Sunday school classrooms.

In 1924, Dr. Herbert Venable Carson accepted the call to Trinity. Wearing his signature Geneva gown, Dr. Carson pastored the church for 18 years. Known for being community-spirited, Dr. Carson was also the minister who guided Trinity through the years of the Great Depression and helped celebrate her Golden Anniversary in 1941. The following year he left Trinity to join the Army Air Force. During the Carson years, 1300 new members joined the church

and three daughter congregations were organized.

Dr. Carson was followed by Dr. Henry Wade DuBose who, in his 18 months of service, provided a smooth transition to the ministry of Dr. Henry Edward "Jeb" Russell, who served from 1944 to 1958.

Dr. Russell was widely traveled, outgoing, a leader in civic and church organizations, and an outdoorsman. During his pastorate, Covenant Presbyterian Church in Capitol Heights was organized.

In January 1951, a fire started in the church basement near the pulpit. Though fought fearlessly, two firefighters died attempting to save the building. The flames devoured the Sanctuary, leaving only the exterior walls standing. Over the next 22 months, Dr. Russell led the rebuilding efforts. Services were held in the fellowship hall while nationally-recognized church architect, Harold Eugene Wagoner,

designed and oversaw local professionals in the project. On October 29, 1952, the restored Sanctuary was dedicated.

In 1959, Robert Strong accepted the call to be Trinity's ninth Senior Minister. Dr. Strong was a powerful preacher who visited his flock regularly. During his ministry, which included the turbulent vears of the Vietnam War and the increase of liberalism in mainstream Christian churches, Dr. Strong led the establishment of Trin-

ity Presbyterian School as well as Trinity Christian Bookstore.

Robert James Ostenson followed as Senior Minister in 1974. When the congregation voted to withdraw, in 1973, from the mainline Presbyterian Church and align with the newly-formed Presbyterian Church in America, Dr. Ostenson's steady hand led our congregation in continuation of the historic Reformed Faith and obedience to the Great Commission, even as litigation raged for years over the ownership of the church's property. During Dr. Ostenson's time at Trinity a new fellowship hall, kitchen facilities and youth rooms were added.

Dr. Cortez Alonzo Cooper succeeded Dr.

Ostenson in 1988. Outgoing and personable, Dr. Cooper was instrumental in establishing Trinity's reputation as a friendly church. A nat-

> ural leader, he was elected Moderator of the PCA's General Assembly for 1990-1991. The missions program flourished during his years at Trinity.

When Dr. Cooper left in 1994, there followed a period of transition. In 1997, John W. P. Oliver,

D.D., who had served as Youth Minister during Dr. Strong's tenure, accepted the call to serve as Senior Minister. Powerful in the pulpit, Dr. Oliver possessed an unerring devotion to the tenets of Reformed theology and the cause of world missions.

In 1999, Trinity issued a call to Claude Eugene McRoberts III, who has the distinction of being Trinity's longest-serving Senior Minister. Under his ministry, the congregation undertook an expansive addition to the facilities which included Trinity Hall, a beautiful and flexible space which each year welcomes thousands of people to church, community, and arts events who might otherwise never have visited. Mr. McRoberts served as Senior Minister until 2022.

Today, we are searching for our fourteenth Senior Minister. While we do not yet know whom God will provide, we are confident in these words from First Thessalonians 5:24: He Who calls you is faithful; He will surely do it. Blessed be the Name of the Lord.

The history of a church is more than a succession of ministers whom God calls to serve it. We do not forget the faithful leaders, teachers, and helpers of our covenant children, youth, and adults; the scores of musicians, the careful secretaries, the selfless volunteers, and those who maintain the physical integrity of the church property. We give thanks for our dedicated elders and deacons who prayerfully and tirelessly lead the congregation.

They wrote, and continue to write, the history of Trinity Presbyterian Church.

ARCHITECTURAL SYMBOLS

The five-petaled gold rosettes in the ceiling, based on a pattern of Martin Luther, are symbolic of the five wounds of Christ and remind us that His substitutionary death, resurrection, and ascension are the only means by which we approach the Triune God. They also represent the five *Solas* of the Reformation: *Sola Scriptura* (Scripture alone), *Solus Christus* (Christ alone), *Sola Fide* (faith alone), *Sola Gratia* (grace alone), *and Soli Deo Gloria* (to the glory of God alone). The light blue ceiling upon which the rosettes rest is part of a centuries-long tradition of church ceilings representing the vault of



Heaven. The Trinity rosettes were designed by Rennie Vainstein and moulded by Decorator's Supply Company of Chicago.


The Pulpit

Designed by renowned Philadelphia architect Harold Wagoner, the pulpit and lectern were installed during the restoration of the Sanctuary after the fire of 1951. The hand-carved symbols on the pulpit are based on the central tenets of the Christian faith.



Wheat - The Bread of Life
